

Giulio Bartolini is Associate Professor of International Law at the Department of Law, University of “Roma Tre” where he teaches International Humanitarian Law and is responsible of the Roma Tre International Humanitarian Law Legal Clinic. Within the IHL Legal Clinic he manages several projects and desk studies in cooperation with the ICRC, the NATO SHAPE Legal Office, the IFRC, and the Italian Red Cross.

He is member of the scientific committee of the IHL Commission of the Italian Red Cross and has acted as legal adviser for this National Society at the 32nd International Conference of Red Cross and Red Crescent (2015) and in several other international meetings.

Prof. Bartolini is also responsible of the Memorandum of Understanding between the Italian Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Legal Office, and Roma Tre University, to provide legal support to the abovementioned Office on public international law issues.

He also collaborates with the Italian Armed Forces on a regular basis. Notably, he has been Co-Director of the Master’s programme in “International Military and Strategic Studies” of the Joint Services Staff College (*Istituto Superiore Stato Maggiore Interforze*) in Rome (2011-2015) and has lectured at several high-level training centres of the Italian Armed Forces as IASD, CoESPU, ISMA, ISSMI, etc.

He is a full member of the International Institute of Humanitarian Law, Sanremo and, apart from IDL courses, prof. Bartolini was appointed “Course Director” in IHL courses for senior officers jointly organised by the Sanremo IIHL, the Ministry of Defence of Montenegro and Albania and the Italian MFA (Podgorica 2015, Tirana, 2017). He has also lectured on several courses of the IIHL. Member of the ‘core expert group’ for the elaboration of the Oxford Guidance on the Law Relating to Humanitarian Relief Operations in Situations of Armed Conflict (University of Oxford/OCHA).

He has been visiting professor/researcher at Leiden University, Grotious Center for International Legal Studies; British Institute of International and Comparative Law; King's College, Department of War Studies; Lauterpacht Centre, University of Cambridge.
